STATEMENT OF COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

October 2, 2017 7:00 p.m.

The City Council of Boone, Iowa, met in regular session in the City Hall Council Chambers on October 2, 2017, at 7:00 p.m. with Mayor Slight presiding. The following Council Members were present: Porter, McGinn, Mallas, Hicks, Piklapp, Nystrom, and Ray. Absent: none.

Mallas moved; Hicks seconded to approve the agenda as presented. Ayes: McGinn, Mallas, Hicks, Piklapp, Nystrom, Ray, and Porter. Nays: none.

Kati Gorman presented the services that Youth and Shelter Services provides and invited the Community to their "Lights on Event" on October 12th from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at Page Elementary School.

Nystrom advised the Council on the situation regarding Buddy Williams request for reimbursement on his water bill. Nystrom stated that staff recommended no reimbursement and that the Utility Committee recommended following the staff recommendation of no reimbursement. Williams addressed the Council to explain the situation and requested a reduction of sewer charges for water used to fill his pool due to the water not going down the sewer. Williams stated that his irrigation meter was broken therefore he used his regular meter; he stated that he will get it fixed one day but not today. Porter moved; seconded by Piklapp to reduce Williams' utility bill by seventy-five dollars (\$75.00) with the requirement that the irrigation meter be repaired by next summer. Ayes: Mallas, Hicks, Piklapp, Nystrom, Ray, Porter, and McGinn. Nays: none.

Nystrom requested a moment of silence in light of the events that happened in Las Vegas.

Piklapp provided an update on current Boone Downtown Incentive Fund grants: Saint Avenue Café has completed their project and the Economic Development Committee will be doing a final walk-through this week. Owners of 807 Story Street have submitted an application and the Committee will be doing the initial walk-through later this week.

Piklapp informed the Council that the City of Marion has completed their walk-through/survey of the City of Boone; this was a cooperative program with the Chamber. Marion had some very positive comments on downtown Boone.

Chief Adams announced the Fire Department's Open House on October 12th.

Chief Wiebold discussed the active shooters drill at the high school starting at noon Wednesday, October 4th that has been planned for over a year, involving multiple organizations.

Council discussed making changes to the current Fireworks Ordinance pertaining to the usage of fireworks. Hicks moved; seconded by Mallas to allow fireworks to be used on July 3rd from noon to 11:00 p.m.; July 4th from noon to 11:00 p.m. and on New Year's Eve from noon through 12:30 a.m. on January 1st. Ayes: Hicks, Ray, Porter, and Mallas. Nays: Piklapp, Nystrom and McGinn.

Nystrom moved; Ray seconded to leave the sale of fireworks as the Ordinance currently states. Ayes: Piklapp, Nystrom, Ray, Porter, McGinn, Mallas, and Hicks. Nays: none.

Skare stated that the Memorandum of Understanding being presented tonight has been modified from the previous version; Section A4 was changed at the request of the medical director, Dr. Mehlhaus. Skare informed the Council that Robbins has reviewed the Contract and is okay with it. Nystrom moved; Porter seconded to approve the Memorandum of Understanding for a Joint Agreement between the City of Boone and Boone County Hospital to provide ambulance service within the City limits and Boone County. Ayes: Nystrom, Ray, Porter, McGinn, Mallas, Hicks and Piklapp.

Skare informed the Council that a written offer has been signed by the new City Engineer/Utility Superintendent with a start date of November 6^{th} .

Skare announced that the Union Pacific Rail Road will be here October 16th to address the Council.

Skare requested those that would like to attend the Boone County League meeting on October 17^{th} to let him know by October 12^{th} .

Mayor Slight asked if there were any questions or items to be removed from the consent agenda; no comments were made.

Mallas moved; Hicks seconded to approve the following items on the Consent Agenda: 1) Minutes of previous meeting(s). 2) Bills payable. 3) Alcohol License renewal for L & M Gas and Grocery. Ayes: Ray, Porter, McGinn, Mallas, Hicks, Piklapp and Nystrom. Nays: none.

A citizen addressed the Council about her concerns of allowing chickens and stated that she does not want them.

The Citizen also informed the Council that a young girl on a moped got her tire caught in a slit at the Crawford Street railroad crossing and requested this be brought to the Union Pacific Railroad's attention to be fixed.

There being no further business to come before the Council the meeting was adjourned at 7:38 p.m.
